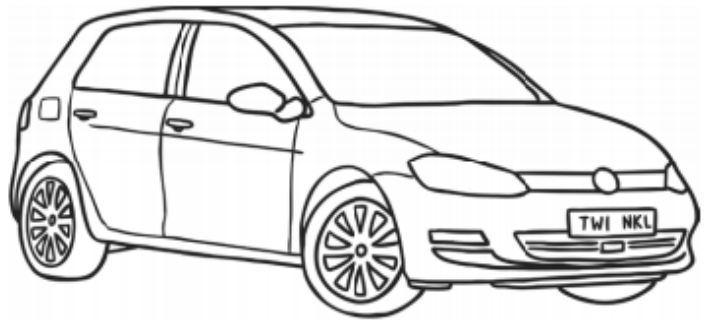

- a) Conor is looking at the bike which belongs to Isla.

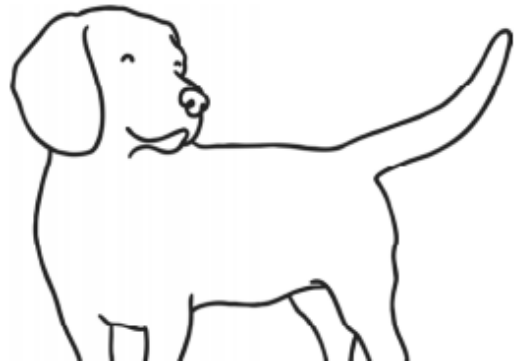
