Lesson 5: Missing Punctuation

Our writing is improving in Year 4, but sometimes many of us are still missing out basic punctuation from our sentences. Today we're going to remind ourselves how to use some of the punctuation that we have looked at so far, then try to correct a paragraph that has missing punctuation.

CAPITAL LETTERS:

Our old favourite! We must always use capital letter AT THE START OF A NEW SENTENCE. Also, don't forget that PROPER NOUNS always need a capital letter, so names of people and places. <u>Titles</u> of books/films and other things also need a capital letter.

FULL STOPS:

Use a full stop at the end of a sentence. The only time you don't do this is if you are replacing the full stop with a question mark or exclamation mark. Otherwise, ALWAYS END YOUR SENTENCE WITH A FULL STOP!

COMMAS:

You will learn more about using commas in Year 5, but there are a few things we already know. Remember when we learned about clauses? Commas are sometimes before those conjunctions to separate two clauses in a sentence, like this:

I had chips and beans for dinner, but I didn't really enjoy it today.

If your sentence includes a fronted adverbial, use a comma after it, like this:

Creeping stealthily towards its prey, the creature prepared its claws for battle!

They are also used to separate items in a list, apart from the last to when you use 'and':

Mrs Bennet had English, maths, spelling, history, science and topic books to mark.

QUESTION MARKS:

This sounds obvious, but if your sentence is a question...use a question mark!!

Your task!

Here is a paragraph with lots and lots of punctuation mistakes!
